answers. I think you do know what it means to be a Canadian.

And I think that in considering what you said I have to consider

you as a person. So for you in your situation I find that you have passed the knowledge

test. And you should be granted Canadian Citizenship. So I'm going to allow this

appeal and I'm going to overturn the order of the Citizenship Judge.

The Government will be told what I have done today and I believe

what they will do is grant your citizenship.
